MCHB/Division of State and Community Health Block Grant Training – Providing Data to Tell the MCH Story

CHRISTOPHER DYKTON: The question Sam was asking was about attachments to the narrative, and what it could be, and also talking about the size limitation within the system for the attachments to the narrative. There's a four-meg, megabyte size limitation on an attachment. In other words, if it goes over four meg, which is quite big, then it can't be attached to a section. The system won't allow it. If it's very important, chances are, you're going to need to contact me, and we will collect it directly from you in order to, you know, present it with all of your application. Needs assessments are sometimes problematic that way, if there's a lot of graphics, especially heavy graphics will eat up a lot of size. So, just contact me if it's over four meg. But you should be able to just attach. It's a very simple thing. In fact, we could just take a look at it here, state narrative. You can see it just says "Attach File" when you go to menu here. One of the things that everyone will attach is letter of transmittal.

And when you click on it, it just pops up, and it allows you to browse, you know, a file, and then attach. It's as simple as that. Now the new types of things that can be attached could be anything from, you know, let's say you did a publication that

one of your activities within, one of your performance measures of activities developed a brochure that had been distributed to, you know, oral health, children and their parents at school. And let's say you want to show us that, what that is. You could make a PDF of that and attach it to a section. Oftentimes, there's data, graphs, charts, pie charts, and so forth that can't be put in the body of a narrative. Or attachments that may help, you know, elucidate a performance measure, or what's going on with your work.

So, anything that, when you start thinking of pictures and graphs, along those lines, those are the things that you'd want to attached to a section. Yes? Any, anybody else?
