 - **Change the State Law and Implement New Reproductive Health Curriculum**
 - **Mississippi House Bill 837 (HB837)**
 - Mississippi is currently an abstinence-only state. The Mississippi State Legislature is currently considering HB837 which would require local school boards to adopt a policy to implement abstinence-only or abstinence-plus education into school curriculum.
 - **Provide Education , Resources, and Trainings (State Policymakers, Schools, Parents, Community, and Youth)**
 - **Incorporate Health Curriculum Trainings to Reproductive and Non-Reproductive Health Providers**

Youth Sexual Health Issues in Oklahoma

- Teen Birth Rate

Primary Data Sources (continued)

OCHA (Oklahoma Health Care Authority) – administers and provides state Medicaid and Insure Oklahoma insurance programs for all state citizens who have no other available health insurance, maintains database on numbers of eligible adolescents and incidence of well and sick clinical visits.

OPNA (Oklahoma Prevention Needs Assessment) – a statewide survey administered by Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services to students in grades 6, 8, 10 and 12 every other year. The survey measures risk behaviors, such as violence and alcohol, tobacco and other drug use that can result in injury, and/or impede positive development among Oklahoma youth. It also evaluates risk and protective factors, which are attitudes, behaviors and opinions that research has shown to be highly correlated with these risk behavior.
