**Transition from Pediatric to Adult Primary  
Care: Hearing from Youth with Special Health  
Care Needs**

*HRSA Office of Women's Health, in collaboration with MCHB/Division of Children with Special Health Care Needs, the HHS Office on Disability and the HHS Office on Women's Health, is completing a 12-month project to examine the transition process from pediatric to adult primary care challenges of young adults (young women and men) with special health care needs. In May 2009, four discussion groups were held with 14 youth between the ages of 18 and 30 years old. The discussion groups addressed health care system and transition issues, general health and well-being, and behavioral health and reproductive health concerns.*

*Commonalities and differences in group themes by sex were identified. Results from this work are being used to develop an "Action Guide" for policymakers and providers.*

**Care Coordination and the Medical Home**

*The patient/family-centered medical home has emerged as a promising model of care that offers improved patient outcome and better use of health care resources. The Institute of Medicine has stated that care coordination is necessary to improve the delivery of care with improvement in care coordination benefiting a broad array of patients across the life span. The focus on care coordination highlighted the lack of consensus on its characteristics, core functions, and desired outcomes. Earlier this year the Commonwealth Fund released a report outlining a multi-disciplinary framework for pediatric care coordination that includes definition, competencies, functions, and performance measures.*

**Promising Practices to Improve Birth Outcomes:  
What We Can Learn From New York**

*This session will review what factors appear to account for New York's relative success in improving birth outcomes, particularly for African-Americans. Among states with more than 10 percent of births to African American women in 2007,*

- *New York had the lowest African-American infant mortality rate (11.7/1,000) during 2003-2005;*
- *New York had the lowest white infant mortality rate (4.65/1,000) during this same period; and*
- *New York had the lowest neo-natal and post neo-natal infant mortality rates in 2007.*

*The key to New York's success appears to be largely the result of involving community agencies and coalitions in its regionalized perinatal hospital system. New York's community based regionalization model goes beyond designating hospitals to provide specialty care to high risk patients to organizing regional perinatal partnerships that unite medical facilities and community service providers in a common purpose.*
